### COMMODORE'S REPORT

With the Agreement to Lease Hakumau Reserve safely deposited with Auckland Council, there are now lease conditions to satisfy before the Lease can be signed. In particular the fencing enclosing the reserve must be designed and installed to the Council's satisfaction. Planning and design is underway.

Foremost in the Executive Committee's consideration at the moment is the challenge of financing the essential and desired developments at the Club:

- The stormwater infrastructure and parking project
- Clubhouse replacement
- Hakumau fencing
- Club Marina refurbishment.

While the Club has accumulated a substantial reserve, this programme will require additional funding to achieve the improvements. Much of the programme is an essential prerequisite for resource consent renewal in 2028. Other parts of the plan may need to be delayed or modified within the available funding.

Refurbishment of the marina berth structures is self-funded by the marina berth licence holders' refurbishment levy, but the Club marinas beside the launching ramps will require similar attention. Marina refurbishment will begin on E pier in December. More information will be sent to E pier owners, with a few vessels needing to be moved – by the owners – to accommodate the replacement of corner brackets and tie rods.

You may have noticed, yet again contractors are digging up the seaward footpath on Tamaki Drive – this time to raise the outer pedestrian surface by half a metre, exquisite planning by Waka Kotahi. In the spirit of cooperation, we have accommodated a couple of containers at

Rob's talk, 'Two things you need to know to save a life', simplified the process of what needs to be done in a cardiac crisis act, push on the chest, get help, act fast! Rob also brought along a defibrillator and mannequin for members to try putting into practise what each had learned. It was great to hear and see how a defib works in a relaxed situation, the machine even talks you through the steps you need to take when dealing with a cardiac medical crisis.

It's rumoured Rob was keen to earn some brownie points towards a pass on his boat inspection, hence putting himself

### **OPERATIONS REPORT**

#### **E PIER REFURBISHMENT**

On December 5, marine contractors will begin work on the refurbishment of E pier. This involves the replacement of the original pile guides and corner brackets. While this work takes place, the power and water will be disconnected to the pier. Boats will be moved out into the fairway up to 1.5m at times, so please take extra precaution when operating your vessel in the Marina.

#### **NEW MARINA GANGWAYS**

You may have noticed the three 15 metre-long aluminium gangways we have recently taken delivery of, which have been temporarily located at the eastern end of the site. These gangways are to replace the ageing original steel gangways on B, C, and D piers. They look



great and will be installed over the coming summer months.

#### NEW WEEKEND OPERATIONS STAFF

We have recently employed two new weekend Operations staff members just in time for the busy season. Their names are Marcus and Tom and both will no doubt be great additions to the team. Be sure to say hi, when you see them around.

## **SEEKING:** BOAT INSPECTORS

If you can spare a couple of hours every few months, then you could be one of our fantastic OBC volunteers who help fellow members get out boating safely!

Yes, we're on the hunt for boat inspectors. Ideally, you'll be an experienced skipper, committed to safety and willing to share your knowledge for the benefit of our new members, and those existing members who change their boats and require inspections.

Boat inspections take place on Saturday mornings, so you would need to be available at this time. We try to rotate inspectors, so you would likely be called up once every three months or as per roster requirements.

As well as feeling the satisfaction of an essential task done well (and safely!), boat inspectors receive an invitation to the annual 'Thank You Evening', in appreciation of their commitment to the Club throughout the year. When Harvey Brookes was put in sole charge of a 15ft tinny while doing a Masters degree in the early '90s, it was the first time the OBC's newest Executive Committee member had skippered a boat. It would be more than

20 years before he did it again.

Growing up, there was little interaction with the water other than what he got from the occasional trip out with mates, but it was a different story when it came to what bordered the water. "I became curious about coastal erosion and why it was happening," explains Harvey, and it developed into a genuine interest in the subject. After receiving a BA in coastal geomorphology and management, he took up an opportunity to study it at a Masters degree level in the Far North, and let's face it, who'd not appreciate the chance to study while being outside and at the beach!

Harvey had to use a boat in order to do the fieldwork. When asked by his supervisor if he knew how to handle a boat, "kind of," was enough for Harvey

to be allocated a 15ft tinny fitted with an enormous jerry-rigged depth sounder and be sent off to do some depth sounding. of fun, it was kind of cool, it was probably really dangerous." Needless to say he survived the experience, got his degree and moved on.

Harvey put his learning to work as a coastal scientist and planner with DoC and subsequently the then Auckland Regional Council. With an involvement in coastal developments under the RMA. he even had a brief link to the OBC. advising the Minister of Conservation during the development of the OBC Marina expansion. "Every time I go to a meeting at the Club now I remember more little bits of that time," Harvey says. Through his work at Council he also had a key role in the navigational and safety aspects of the 2000 America's Cup. Later Harvey moved on to work for the Ministry of Economic Development (now MBIE), before returning for a further stint with Auckland Council.

Seven years ago, Harvey went out on



his own as a consultant and contractor specialising in economic development and community wellbeing. His wife Caroline, meanwhile, wears several hats: Practice Manager at an architecture company, and a RMA consents consultant, as well as being a practising artist and art tutor.

And now, Harvey has the added responsibilities of a member of the OBC's Executive Committee. With a strong background in the Resource Management Act

Resource Management Act combined with his knowledge of the land itself, there's little doubt his contributions will be of great benefit to the Club and its current and future projects. Getting off on a running start to his duties, Harvey is one of five members of the new Strategic Plan Committee, which will be tackling an update of the Club's Strategic Plan.

Harvey joined the OBC in 2013, at the same time he finally got the opportunity to become a boat owner rather than a passenger. Although perhaps 'opportunity' isn't quite the right word. "I was flying out to Great Barrier and looking down at the water, and thinking about how much I was going to have to spend on some planned house extensions... or I could just buy a boat," says Harvey. "Much more fun. So I ended up buying my first boat and joining the OBC."

A friend had a Rayglass Legend and Harvey's familiarity with that boat helped decide his own vessel. He found 'Aquadisiac', a Rayglass 620 with a Yamaha 150 Salt Water Series hanging off the stern. The 620 served Harvey and Caroline for seven years, until 2020 when they replaced it with 'Black Pearl', a Rayglass 730 with Merc 350 inboard power. "The 620 was cool," Harvey explains, "but it had its disadvantages.

I was always keen on a boat with a proper head - not something you had to pull the bed to pieces to get to, and other conveniences."

Harvey is rapt with the 'upgrade' in boats, although it hasn't all been plain sailing. After returning to Black Pearl following a New Year's Eve visit to a friend's vessel, Harvey and Caroline found themselves up to their knees in water. It turned out a pipe to the live bait tank had cracked. The boat survived, but the Merc had to be replaced. It's not the only problem they've had, suffice it to say: "Coastguard knows who I am!"

Black Pearl is stored near home, and although Harvey has recently joined the hardstand wait-list, he enjoys the convenience of being able to go down the road and tinker with the boat when he chooses. Driving across town to launch at the OBC doesn't phase him, and he and Caroline treat the boat "like a bach". Harvey's admiring of others' skills when it comes to fishing, but not being particularly avid fishers themselves ("I can catch lots of fish, but 95 percent I have to throw back."), boating is more about enjoying the Gulf. "I just love being out there, love visiting the islands, having dinner on the boat, watching the sun go down," says Harvey. "That's just magic, it makes me so happy."





## **EMPOWERING HAURAKI GULF COMMUNITIES**

The future health of the Hauraki Gulf Marine Park relies on localised management, by empowering and connecting mana whenua with local communities to take care of the marine environment.

This concept is called Ahu Moana, using the combined strengths of mana whenua, organisations, and communities who know their local waters, then channeling that energy to protect and restore the marine ecosystem in a way that benefits everyone. As New Zealand's premier Marine Park we

Earlier in the year, the New Zealand Sport Fishing Council worked with Coromandel iwi Ngāti Hei in creating a policy recognising Ahu Moana as a form of localised spatial management. Our community is on board with Ahu Moana initiatives all over the Hauraki Gulf Marine Park, as it would mean opportunities for all stakeholders to have a say on issues and solutions around their local patch. Who's going to object to more fish in the water, more local tourism, and business opportunities?

The Outboard Boating Club has supported previous Ahu Moana initiatives. In 2020, eastern Coromandel iwi Ngāti Hei worked with the Opito Bay Ratepayers Association to gather community support for a rāhui on scallop harvesting - an excellent example of how mana whenua and the community might work together in an Ahu Moana sense.

LegaSea supports initiatives that will provide more meaningful fisheries management solutions that can be passed down generationally. Ngāti Hei has already made an Ahu Moana application for the Alderman Islands which are within its rohe moana.

If you support these solutions, talk with your local fishing club, organisation or community group to work out how you can get involved with mana whenua to improve your local marine environment.

### **FISHING REPORT**

**KEEPING it FRESH** 

It's great getting away boating and camping over the summer holidays. Warm days, plenty of family time, fishing trips and delicious seafood. One of the keys to enjoying seafood is the way it's treated from the boat to the plate. It can be very easy to neglect the precious catch in the warm sun, while having a social beer or quick swim in the ocean.

Fish care starts before you head out on the water, with making sure you have a good chilly bin and plenty of ice. Don't use just any ice, make sure it is salt water ice as freshwater can make the fish spoiling bacteria take hold a lot faster. If you don't have access to salt water ice you can use plastic drink bottles and fill them with water and freeze them. This makes a good

alternative and they are reusable. It's a good idea to make a slurry with any ice or cooling method in your chilly bin by adding a bucket of salt water, as this will quickly chill the fish down.

When you catch a fish that you are going to keep to eat, make sure you put it in a landing net or hold it in a wet rag. Letting it flap on the deck will cause stress and bruise the flesh. Once secured, quickly dispatch your catch with the preferred method of Ike. This is spiking the brain of the fish. Some really serious anglers take Ike a step further and use a thin wire down the backbone of the fish to further reduce the stress and release of lactic acid.

Most anglers don't bleed snapper, but darker flesh species like kahawai, trevally, kingfish and tuna are much better to eat if they have been bled. To do this, after the fish is dispatched, cut across the centre of the fish between the gill plates and place the fish in a bucket of seawater or hold the fish over the side. Once bled, place in the slurry in your chilly bin. If you have room it's nice to take set fish out of the slurry and put them in fresh salt water ice after a couple of hours if you are not going to process them for a while. This takes the fish away from all the blood and other contaminants that can speed up spoiling of the fish.

Once it comes time to process your catch make sure you have a good fillet knife (I keep my filleting knives away from the boat so they don't get used as bait knives). Process each fish carefully. Try to make use of all the pieces. With the fillets, wipe them dry with some paper towels. Again, residue fluids will spoil fish faster. Place dry fillets in an airtight container in the fridge. If dry and kept at below 3-degrees, they will happily last five days. In fact the eating quality on day three will probably be the best, especially if you want to have some sashimi or a ceviche (see page 28 for a tasty ceviche recipe by Jamie Oliver-Ed).

Freezing fish will definitely change the structure of the cells in the flesh, and not all fish freezes well. Some can go quite mushy while other species handle freezing a lot better. Hapuku, bluenose and deep water

species freeze the best, and snapper, gurnard and John Dory are okay, while the darker fish seem to take on a fishier taste. Fish will last for about three months if treated properly from the get go. The other really critical element to making frozen fish last is to vacuum seal fish once you've dried it. Vacuum sealing is airtight and slows down any degradation and freezer burn. Enjoy your holiday and serve up plenty of Christmas cheer and some nice fresh fish. *Note: the new season of the Fishy Business TV show starts on Prime TV, Saturday December 3, at 5.00pm. • **YELLOW** line tarmac parking is allocated (and numbered) to permanent



hardstand members who must always park back in their allocated spot.

• Marina parking on the rock wall is for MBLH's and Berth Renters - *STRICTLY NO VISITOR PARKING* - MBLH's and Berth Renters please note this is also your responsibility.

• Spaces between the trees along the railway line are allocated to permanent hardstand occupiers, numbered and denoted by 'R' yellow tag.

• Early morning departing fishos wishing to take out guests need to arrange a parking pass for them.

#### WASH DOWN BAYS

• The Club supports environmentally friendly practices and encourages the use of biodegradable cleaning products such as 'SALT AWAY'.

• On busy days to avoid congestion around the ramps a washing time of 5 minutes should be sufficient.

• It is recommended that you supply your own hose fittings as they tend to go missing faster than Operations can replace them.

Over summer there is a noticeable increase in boats coming and going and with this comes the need for increased vigilance and security.

On no account will a boat be allowed to depart through the gates without the corresponding member access card being used. Security staff have received clear instructions on this requirement. Members must not use their card to assist someone else to circumvent this requirement as this is easily tracked. The message, therefore, is, "Don't leave home without your access card".

- Ensure your access card is not attached to or marked with OBC identification.
- Members are responsible for their guest/s' behaviour on Club grounds.
- OBC's Liquor License does not allow BYO. Alcohol can only be consumed within the clubhouse during bar opening hours, or on board a private marina vessel.
- No tailgating through the gate.

#### **FILLETING STATION**

Please separate your heads, frames and offal properly! Any offal put in the other bins creates crosscontamination and means the entire bin of fish goes to waste. These fish parts are feeding people and helping the community, please treat these parts as if you were feeding your own family.

There is a CCTV camera installed in the station. If you witness an occurrence, or find the station left in a mess, let us know date/time and Operations will review camera footage. Offenders will be taken to task. Skippers, you are responsible for your guests so please make sure they are aware of the requirements.



#### RUBBISH

Coming home after a day out on the boat, we understand you are tired but your cooperation is gratefully appreciated when it comes to disposing of your rubbish.

- No fish or bait leftovers in the rubbish bins use the appropriate filleting station bins.
- The small black bins located adjacent to all the marina piers are for the flushing of small auxiliary outboards they are not rubbish bins.
- Four large rubbish bins are conveniently located around the site. No 'household' rubbish please.

## COOK THE CATCH

#### **METHOD**

- 1. Deseed and very finely chop the pepper, trim and finely slice the spring onions, then add to a bowl.
- 2. Slice the fish into 1cm cubes, add to the bowl, cover and place in the fridge until needed.
- 3. Squeeze the lemon juice into a jam jar, add 1 teaspoon of sea salt, then deseed, finely chop and add the chilli.
- 4. Pop the lid on and place in the fridge to chill this may seem like a lot of salt but most of it gets drained away. Pick the herbs and cress, and place in the fridge.
- 5. You can assemble the ceviche just before eating, but it's important that you don't leave the fish marinating for too long – you don't want the acids in the juices to cook the fish. Pour the lemon dressing over the fish mixture and immediately mix it up. Leave it to sit for about 2-1/2 minutes while you lay out the plates.
- 6. Throw most of the herb mixture into the bowl with the fish and very quickly toss it together no more than 10 seconds.
- 7. Divide the ceviche between four plates, gently spoon over a little of the dressing (discarding the rest) and sprinkle with the remaining herbs.
- 8. Drizzle over a little oil from a height, sprinkle with freshly ground black pepper, and enjoy.

# GOODBYE DINGHY, GOODBYE OARS

The Sealegs 12RC takes the amphibious boat to another level. Richard Milner spent a few hours on Auckland Harbour putting the new boat through its paces and came away impressed.

What started in 2001 as an idea on a napkin has, some 20 years later and around 1500 boats on the water and let's not forget the beach, too, grown to become a success story of kiwi boat building.

For those that don't know, Sealegs combines New Zealand's privilege of great boating with trouble-free launching, retrieving, and going ashore and exploring our beautiful coastline. Of course, it doesn't stop there. Sealegs boats have gone worldwide in recreational and commercial operations and are now in more than 55 countries.

No other amphibious boat manufacturer has had the nerve to go after the larger boat series like SeaLegs. The Sealegs 12RC is a brave move for a 12m boat. It's not the typical floating holiday home of many other designs. It's not baked in suede and soft touches, but it is practical and well presented, from the generous cockpit to the modest cabin area. While the 12m is overkill at a concrete ramp, I have to admit it's pretty cool transitioning to the water. Simply get going, and it drives just like a car. Until you have experienced it, you can't understand how easy it is to launch and retrieve, and you would never go back to a trailer. But what is more impressive is at 12m the Sealegs 12RC is not really what you would classify as a trailer boat.

**BOAT REVIEW** 

Sealegs 12RC

The Sealegs 12RC immediately gives the impression of practical boating. Its large cockpit and functional design are spacious and purposeful, with people and openness in mind. The forward helm is a stroke of intentional genius. It's quite a neat experience to be so far forward and a comfortable feeling with wrap-around visibility. When approaching the beach, a camera in the wheel well sorts that blind spot out.

The helm is clean with large MFDs, all the switches and necessary equipment easily to hand and the controls for the wheels are housed in a comfortable position whether standing or sitting. A pedestal helm seat bolstered for sitting, leaning, or standing gives you the best options. Both port and starboard windows slide back for fresh air, and overhead are two powered sunroofs. It is light and airy, a great feature.

The Sealegs 12RC is fitted with a port dining area with a reversible forward seat for daytime cruising or entertaining. This folds down to overnight in a reasonably comfortable double berth. Behind the helm is a galley with a sink and double burner, fridge, and storage. Again, practical and functional. Separating you from the elements is a double door and an electric window behind the seating area, which opens the interior to give maximum connection with the cockpit. A real entertainer's must.

The forward cabin is also practical, with no frills attached. It has a sleeping area for three at a push. Under the tubes, there is a shelf on each side to store items, along with storage under the squabs. The cabin is fully carpet-lined, and has a forward top hatch for light and air.

The cockpit is extra-large with four fitted seats and heaps of sitting area on the tubes. There is impressive underfloor storage, a full-width work area, and large sliding drawers over the engine bay for the wheels. The cockpit is self-draining through large grates and on the starboard side a swim platform with ladder slides out at water level.

Power is provided by twin Yamaha 425hp outboards giving just over 38 knots at wide-open-throttle on standard props, and comfortably cruises at 4000rpm doing 23 knots and burning a combined 97l/hr. The Sealegs 12RC is an impressive example of what can be achieved as a dayboat and weekender for the boys or a family that doesn't need the soft pleasures. Sealegs also reminded me this is just one layout, and other options are available in the 12RC range. Sealegs welcomes customer interaction. This particular boat was off to South Australia to be used commercially in the charter industry,

Okay, so how much? Sealegs said as fitted with all the fruit you would expect and those impressive twin Yamaha outboards, she is worth in the vicinity of \$1.35million. You don't

need a tender and don't get your feet wet. Coupled with the performance and practicality, the price becomes a small consideration. This particular Sealegs is one of a kind and a real winner.
