

PEDESTRIAN CROSSING AT ENTRANCE

In our ongoing effort to improve Health and Safety around the site, we have created a pedestrian crossing leading from the Hakumau Reserve to the clubhouse. FISHING REPORT

ISLAND ADVENTURE

Kawau Island is located in the Hauraki Gulf and is an ideal spot for a fishing adventure whether you fish from a small tinny or a larger vessel suited to overnight trips.


Kawau is a popular destination for fishing enthusiasts due to its diverse range of fish species and stunning natural scenery. Fishing around the island is a unique experience that offers plenty of opportunities to catch different types of fish using various techniques. Kawau is also a great next step spot for boaties looking to gain on-water experience, outside of harbours, including launching spots, navigation, overnight anchorages and fishing different terrain.

Kawau Island offers a range of fish species, including snapper, kingfish, trevally, kahawai, and john dory. Snapper is by far the most popular fish species in the area, and it can be caught all year 'round. Kingfish is another highly sought-after species, especially during the summer months when they are more abundant. Trevally and kahawai are also common, and they can be caught using a variety of techniques.

When it comes to tackle, the type of fishing you want to do will determine the kind of gear you need. For snapper, a standard boat fishing or bait feeder spinning reel with 20-30lb braided line and a 20-30lb fluorocarbon leader is sufficient. For kingfish, a heavier set-up with a 40-60lb braided line and a 60-100lb fluorocarbon leader is necessary. For trevally and kahawai, a lighter setup with a 10-20lb braided line and a 10-20lb fluorocarbon leader is suitable. Soft bait and bait fishing are both popular techniques for catching fish around Kawau Island. When it comes to soft bait, the most effective method is to

use a 1/4-1oz jig head with a soft plastic lure in natural colours such as brown, green, or orange. Some popular soft bait lures for snapper include the 5-inch jerk shads and 5-inch paddle tails. For bait fishing, pilchards and squid are the most common baits used for snapper and kingfish. Trevally and kahawai can be caught using small chunks of pilchard or squid on a small hook.

Kawau Island has a few different options for launching your boat. Sandspit, located on the mainland, is the closest and most popular launching spot. There is a small fee to launch from here, and it can get quite busy during peak season. Alternatively, you can launch from Omaha or Mahurangi, which are both a bit further away but tend to be less busy.

There are several anchorages around Kawau Island that are perfect for overnight stays. Mansion House Bay is the most popular anchorage, offering stunning scenery and good protection from the wind. Bon Accord Harbour is another great option, with several anchorages to choose from and plenty

of fish in the area. Vivian Bay is a bit more secluded and offers a quieter experience, although it can get a bit rough in bad weather.

Fishing around Kawau Island is a fantastic experience that offers a range of fish species and techniques to suit different preferences. Whether you're a seasoned angler or just starting out, there's something for everyone in this beautiful part of New Zealand.

Remember to check local weather and tides before heading out.

Jeremy Davis is a second-generation OBC member who has many fond memories of the Club his father joined back in the '70s. An impressionable youngster then, now Jeremy's introducing his own family to the delights of the OBC and boating, and they've taken to it like, well, the proverbial ducks to water.

Jeremy has experienced the joys of launching at public ramps, and all that involves. Waiting to launch or retrieve, trying to hold the boat against the moving seas while the car and trailer is backed in, so many other people all trying to do the same things at the same time; the OBC is an oasis of calm in comparison!

"The OBC's amazing, they do so much for the members," said Jeremy, who enjoys being able to wash down the boat then and there, have fish filleted for him ("if we've caught any"), not having to struggle to find parking, or sit in long queues. The advantages of Club membership are almost endless.

But the ease and convenience of the OBC is not all that Jeremy and his family appreciates. "It's that sense of belonging, of community," he says.

The family is also very active event participants - in fact Jeremy tells us that

the kids always grab the Outboarder when it arrives in

the post, and scour the pages for events they can attend. From movie nights to fishing competitions, you'll likely find the family and Swallow, their Buccaneer 565, in there boots (or rods) and all.

For Jeremy, boating has been a part of his life as long as he can remember, and he was about 10-years old when his dad joined the OBC. There followed around seven or eight years of enjoyable family boating based from the Club. Ultimately, however, Jeremy's dad moved on to a sailboat, and the family's days of solely motorised boating were done.

"My dad was a Pom, he'd never done any sailing or boating. When he came to New Zealand there was this whole harbour to explore on a boat. And I think he realised, as a lot of people do, that if he wanted something we could stay on, a sailing boat was going to be a cheaper option," Jeremy explained.

Jeremy himself has also spent time under sail, going so far as to compete overseas in Hobie Cats. As part of a two-man team with a guy who'd lost both legs below the knee when he was electrocuted while sailing (the mast hit overhead lines), they

raced in San Diego.

Jeremy spent four years in various countries while on his OE. He taught water-skiing and sailing at a Summer Camp in Pennsylvania, USA, while taking advantage of the winters to indulge his other passion snow skiing, and taught sailing and water skiing in Turkey. A travelling highlight was working on a commercial salmon boat out of Dillingham, Alaska, for three months.

He's owned various sail boats, as well as ski boats, but those were all prior to having kids. Jeremy and Britt, who've been together 14 years, met through an "orchestrated introduction" (sounds much better than 'blind date'!) and share the love of boating, and the desire to pass on that love to kids Luke (10) and Poppy (8). Teenager Aiden is of the age when he's far too distracted by rugby and girls to want to go family boating, but there's hope he'll show more interest once he's past that 'stage'. They've only had the boat three years, purchased three weeks before the first lockdown, so there's plenty of time.

It was during a holiday up north, that Jeremy and Britt discussed getting a boat. The kids had always been around the water, albeit land-based, and were now old enough, and the couple was keen to open them up to some new experiences. "For us it was, let's introduce the kids to a whole new aspect of delight, and that's being on the water, and in the water, and at some places that we wouldn't necessarily be able to get to without having a boat. And they absolutely love it," said Jeremy.

Summer or winter, when the weather's good - and Jeremy admits they're mostly fairweather boaties - Swallow's bow is pointed towards Sandy Bay at Motuihe, near the Rakino Channel and nice and accessible. They spend quite a bit of time on Waiheke: Garden Cove and places down the east coast - Oneroa and Onetangi. Due to Swallow's size, that's about as far as they've ventured at this point.

Fishing is also a family affair, and they'll head to the Noises or Ahaaha rocks. The kids are

getting more into fishing now they're getting older and catching a few more fish. They don't have a lot of patience if there's no bites (who does??), but when there are, it's great fun. Plus, "They don't mind catching them and putting them back in, and of course on the light gear they probably feel like they're bringing in a whale," laughed Jeremy.

"We spent a lot of time at Woody Bay, Rakino, as kids," he said. "I took mum out on the boat a while ago, and when I asked where she'd like to go, she said Rakino. She's 85, and loved the trip down memory lane." It's all about making memories really, and the OBC is a big part of it. "All the stuff we did as kids. We loved bringing the boat in and out, going under the bridge.

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The memories I've got of going under the bridge as a kid, it's the same buzz... every time we bring the boat in the kids are like 'woahhhh', while I'm thinking, oh heck, did I bring the rods down out of the rocket launchers!"

Fortunately, he's not forgotten to do that yet, although there was one occasion of forgetfulness. Jeremy was retrieving the boat on a ramp near the clubhouse, when he forgot to raise the outboard. Embarrassing enough, but it happened in front of a group of

former Club commodores who'd gathered for a morning tea. One of those former commodores was kind enough to point out the error, although he did also say not to worry, Jeremy wasn't the first one to forget. He likely won't be the last, either.

As passionate about boating as he is, Jeremy's 'day job' doesn't involve boats or the water. With a background in marketing/ advertising and sales, Jeremy and a good mate initially established their own agency. Then about six years ago, Jeremy headed off to the Home Show with the intention of finding someone to help him tidy up his garage. He was surprised to discover that, while there was plenty on offer to do so, there was no one company that could bring it all together. He wasn't slow to recognise the gap in the market, and after discussing it with his existing business partner, the two shifted gears and formed 'Pimp My Garage'. Jeremy reckons his OCD is the perfect match for designing garage spaces with a place for everything and everything in its place!

And in the boating future? Well, a bigger boat is floating out there somewhere, as overnighting is something the family would all like to be able to do. "It's the next level really," said Jeremy. "We'll often go home from Waiheke and the kids will go 'I don't want to go home, when are we going to get something like that' - and they point

In the meantime, it's all about bringing the family together on Swallow and having loads of fun. As Britt has said, "The two best things we've ever bought are the spa pool, and the boat."









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
COASTGUARD partners with LIVE OCEAN

As an organisation fortunate enough to spend a lot of time on Aotearoa New Zealand's ocean, lakes and rivers, Coastguard is always looking for ways to play its part in caring for our beautiful waters. That's why we're stoked to announce our partnership with Live Ocean and its amazing team, founded by Peter Burling and Blair Tuke. Live Ocean Foundation champions the ocean and supports top marine scientists, innovators, and communicators committed to driving action for a healthy ocean. We're excited to work

with them and help amplify the need to protect and restore our marine ecosystem for future generations of kiwis to enjoy.

This summer, Live Ocean and Manta Watch New Zealand have been encouraging everyone to be on the lookout for majestic te whai rahi oceanic manta rays. Globally, oceanic manta are listed as endangered, but we simply don't know enough about the manta in New Zealand waters to inform protection at the moment. If you're out on the water – keep an eye out and





play your part by reporting any manta sightings here: https://mantawatchnz.org Excitingly, Live Ocean recently announced the Swim4TheGulf campaign, where 33-year-old Jono Ridler will attempt a New Zealand record non-stop ultradistance open water swim from Aotea Great Barrier Island to Narrow Neck Beach, Auckland, around the end of April. Jono aims to push the boundaries of human endurance by attempting the 100km ocean swim without a wetsuit to inspire action to improve the health of the Hauraki Gulf. This feat will be considered the longest continuous solo-unassisted open-water swim ever recorded in New Zealand, surpassing the current record of 80.8km. The estimated duration of the swim is between 30 to 35 hours. Read more about this massive attempt on the Live Ocean website: https://liveocean.com/foundation/ swim4thegulf

Some of our Hauraki Gulf-based Coast-guard Units will be supporting Jono out on the water during his attempt. We're incredibly excited to be part of this important mahi to bring attention to the state of the Hauraki Gulf and how we can play our part in preserving it for future generations.

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SCALLOPS CAN BREATHE AT LAST

Last month Stuart Nash, the then Minister of Oceans and Fisheries, decided to do the right thing and fully shut the Coromandel scallop fishery, as there are no longer enough scallops to support harvesting.

This means there will be no commercial or recreational scalloping between Leigh, north of Auckland, and Maketū in the Bay of Plenty. Customary harvest is still allowed, but in most areas respective iwi/hapū have agreed they will not issue

customary permits. All efforts are aimed at contributing to the rebuild of scallops. This full closure has been highly anticipated for a while. Most of the Coromandel scallop fishery was shut to harvesting in 2022. Only two areas remained open: one around Little Barrier and the other in the Colville Channel.

Last December Minister David Parker announced an emergency closure of the fishery until a more permanent solution was consulted on. This was due to extremely low scallop numbers in the remaining open fishing areas.

In February this year, we submitted in support of the full closure of the fishery, which finally now has Ministerial approval.

This positive news means scallops finally have a chance to recover, and we can focus on what's next. Fisheries New Zealand (FNZ) must review the fishery within the next three years.

But, scallop dredging is still not being addressed by FNZ. Its latest plan for the Hauraki Gulf Marine Park will permit dredging in certain areas if the scallop fishery reopens.

More than 30,000 New Zealanders want scallop dredging banned from the Hauraki Gulf Marine Park. LegaSea and the OBC agree with these kiwis.

Towing large, weighted dredges back and forth, damaging the seafloor and its creatures is no longer acceptable. We'd like to see a shift away from scallop dredging in favour of more selective methods such as hand gathering.

With OBC right alongside us, we have a chance to get dredging out of the Hauraki Gulf altogether. If you support a ban on scallop dredging and other destructive fishing methods such as bottom trawling, sign our petition here:

GOOD OIL GOING BAD

From Maritime New Zealand

It's not only large shipping incidents that can result in oil making its way into our oceans and harbours. Oily water sometimes ends up in the ocean from small vessels, too, and can take a toll on the environment. Even clean bilges can unexpectedly have oil and water mixtures in them.

By taking simple steps, we can protect our precious freshwater and the marine environments by minimising any oil being discharged overboard:

- Maintain your engine to minimise leaks and have a drip pan to catch any drips.
- Use absorbent pads in your bilge to protect the environment by ensuring any surface oil is 'mopped up'.
- Install a float switch located to stop discharge before any floating oil can be sucked up by a bilge pump. This will help



keep our waters clean!

We depend on our oceans and rivers for our livelihoods and wellbeing. The 2022 State of the Environment report (https://environment.govt.nz/publi cations/environment-aotearoa-2022/waita-ocean-and-marine-conditions) outlines how New Zealand's marine and freshwater environments are being affected by pollution, climate change, and resource depletion.



COOK THE CATCH

STEAK ala BISTEK

The fish version of Filipino Bistek Tagalog, it's a simple yet yummy dish for lunch or dinner.

INGREDIENTS

1.5kg kingfish steaks

3 medium onions, sliced into rings

1 lemon

6 tbs soy sauce

5 cloves garlic, crushed

2-1/2 tbs salt

1 tsp granulated white sugar

1/4 tsp ground black pepper

1 cup water

3/4 cup cooking oil

INSTRUCTIONS

- 1. Rub salt all over the fish steaks. Let sit for 20 minutes.
- Heat 1/2 cup oil in a pan. Fry the fish for 3 to 5 minutes per side or until golden brown. Set aside.
- 3. Heat 3 to 4 tablespoons oil in a cooking pot. Saute garlic until light brown.
- 4. Add 1/3 of the total onions, continue to saute until soft.
- 5. Add soy sauce and juice of the lemon into the cooking pot.
- 6. Add water and bring to boil.
- 7. Add sugar and ground black pepper. Stir.
- 8. Put the fried fish steaks into the pot. Cover and cook over medium heat for 3 minutes.



- 9. Turn the fish over in a way that the opposite side faces the bottom of the pot. Add the remaining onion. Cover and continue to cook for 3 to 5 minutes.
- 10. Transfer to a serving plate. Serve with rice.



EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE REPORT

Highlights of the Executive Committee Meeting held March 29, 2023, with nine Committee members and General Manager Phil Davenport present.

HEALTH AND SAFETY

No incidents or accidents to report; 223 days since any accidents or incidents on site. GM's Health and Safety report accepted as read.

FINANCIALS

The OBC and Whakatakataka Bay financial reports for the month ended February 28, 2023 as presented and circulated were approved.

OPERATIONS REPORT

The report was circulated, and taken as read. Meeting discussion:

- Riverhead trip only 17 attendees. Weather was good.
- Kids fishing comp: Only 26 kids attended this year, far fewer than usual. Thanks to Burnnand Marine for its continued sponsorship.
- Fish & Chips Fridays. Approx 45 people attended each evening held. Good feedback.
- Wednesday night Twilight Fishing Competition. The last two evenings cancelled due to lack of attendees.

GENERAL BUSINESS

- STRATEGIC PLANS REQUEST FOR PROPOSAL: The GM sent eight invitations out. So far there have been five responses, all unable to participate. GM to chase balance.
- HAKUMAU RESERVE NEW FENCE PROPOSAL: Auckland Council has

- approved in principle the Club's proposal to fence Hakumau Reserve. The proposal requires the approval of the OLB, we already have Ngati Whatua approval. We are hopeful OLB will approve the proposal.
- BUDGET 2023/24: Phil Davenport presented the 2023/2024 budgets for both the Whakatakataka Bay Marina and the OBC. He went through each thoroughly. The only outstanding item is to agree the Marina Levy which will impact the budget. In principle, members were happy. To be adopted at the April Exec Committee meeting.

The Finseeker 260 DC is unequivocally pitched at the serious fisherman, but it is also designed to attract the family cruising oriented buyer.

No matter your bent, this boat has 'Let's Go Fishing' written all over it; however, being kiwis, we will also tow water toys, dive and go family cruising. That aside, this is still a no-holds-barred fishing boat.

Finseeker is built in the USA by Crownline Boats as its fishing orientated series. These comprise a range of four centre consoles from 6.25m to 6.93m, and two dual console hardtops.

The smaller of the latter two, the 260 DC (Dual Console) is 7.87m LOA, while the 280 DC is 8.18m. If you are looking at keeping the 260 DC in a marina or a dry berth, the overall length, including the engines up, is around 9.0m, so it will easily fit into a 10m marina. Both hulls share the 2.86m beam and have

the same floor plan and specs, with the 280 DC being 191kgs heavier.

When Crownline first conceived the idea of the 260 DC and 280 DC models, it wanted to blend two mediums, family boating and serious fishing. To achieve this, it needed to incorporate safety, comfort, performance, entertainment and convenience, with the needs of hardcore fishing. The 260 DC has achieved that and more.

In keeping with the blending of the cruising family boating and serious fishing modes, the rear of the cockpit incorporates a drop-down bench seat, complete with a soft backrest.

The massive forward screens are split by a central door which gives access to the open bow area and provides ventilation into the enclosed wheelhouse area.

To starboard is the feature-packed helm. Twin 12-inch Garmin MFDs on the test boat were optional, and you have

several choices regarding the electronics package.

To port is the surprisingly large head compartment, complete with a granite vanity, electric head and raised how!

The Finseeker 260 DC is supplied ready for fishing action. You just need to bring along vour tackle and bait. The transom features a 98-litre live bait well complete with I FD lighting, plus aeration and recycle systems.

Once you have your fish aboard, there are two deep underfloor self-draining fish bins, also with LED lighting, in the rear of the cockpit and a 360-litre bin built under the starboard seating module. The sidehinged lid makes it easy to load a big fish in and is also perfect for keeping your drinks and food cool or maybe your bait and some dry ice.

One of the most popular options on the boat for those into their fishing is the twin outriggers which mount on the cabin roof and are fully adjustable from the inside.

There are dual tackle storage drawers under the helm and passenger seats, plus another deep storage locker between. If you are into diving, then this is the perfect wet locker for your gear.

This is the second Finseeker I have



reviewed, and while the 260 DC and the 280 DC are almost clones, that extra length makes the distinction between the two. Both offer the versatility that Crownline wanted to achieve, and with the Finseeker 260 DC, it is plain to see and works well. Although this boat is more akin to the serious fisherman, it offers enough to be suitable as a combo cruiser-fisher.
