

Continued strong support for the regular flare demonstrations held at the OBC under the supervision of Coastguard could be explained several ways – either members have very little experience with the deployment of flares in an emergency (not a bad thing), or we have a lot of people who wanted to get a jump on Guy Fawkes night, happening in close proximity to the November 1 demo.

Regardless of the reasons for attending, as anyone who has found themselves in the unfortunate position of needing rescue can tell you, distress flares are an essential part of your onboard safety supplies. So, it helps to understand their purpose and know how use them. The weather was perfect for an outdoor activity and despite the number of flares let off, no-one needed to be rescued from the drink.

John Verstegen of Coastguard ran the hands-on demonstration with members, explaining how to activate flares safely and effectively. He provided valuable insights about the importance of flares and the different types of flares available. As with previous events, this evening also provided members with an opportunity to safely dispose of expired flares.

The OBC/Coastguard flare demo nights are held quarterly, as they continue to be a beneficial and educational experience for Club members. Keep an eye on the calendar for the next opportunity.

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COMMODORE'S REPORT

HARDSTAND WORK TO START

Tenders for stages one, two and three of the hardstand, as discussed in my report last month, have been received and by the time you are reading this the construction contract will have been signed with Lawton Construction for the work.

Lawton's principal, John Lawton, has been assisting the Property Committee voluntarily since 2020. His experience in the construction industry has been essential. To ensure John's involvement in the tender process was impartial, the process was overseen by an independent Quantity Surveyor, Paul Ranum of Deane, Murray and Partners Ltd. Paul is being retained as engineer of the project to provide professional oversight during construction. Work should commence before the end of November.

We are also pleased to advise that the final contract price will be under the \$2,000,000 plus GST approved at the AGM.

As discussed also last month, summer is not ideal for a construction project from a Club traffic perspective. But with a project like this, summer weather is of course more productive for the contractor (and importantly the Club's costs). John Lawton has assured the Committee that access past the construction will be maintained at all times. I mentioned last month that we had contracted another, more rigorous, geotechnical investigation borehole at the clubhouse site by Soil and Rock Consultants. It was hoped that the materials beneath the clubhouse may not be subject to earthquake liquefaction. Unfortunately, this bore confirmed liquefaction could be a factor and, in that case, any piles would need to be driven in the bedrock to 30m. We are now consulting with piling experts to find the most cost-effective method of preparing foundations for the new clubhouse.

I would like to welcome Peri Snow and Shane Hollis to the Club's staff team. Peri has joined as Events and Promotions Coordinator, continuing the role previously held by less van Wyk (nee Shears). She has certainly been thrown in the deep end with functions coming up, including the OBC Kids Christmas Party. Jess is being very helpful in the transition. Shane has joined the Operations team and will be working Friday through Monday. He will be the Club's frontman for most of those members who launch during the weekends. Derek, Ross and Marcus will continue to roster on with Shane at the weekends.

It has been good to see the weather improving. We have had some nice weekends and bait sales have been vigorous. I can only comment secondhand, but I am told the fish are biting and members are bringing home good bags. Here's hoping this continues.

2023-2025 RECREATIONAL CRAFT STRATEGY LAUNCHED

Highlights of this year's Safer Boating Week (October 16-22) included the unveiling of 2023-2025 recreational craft strategy. The strategy will outline how Safer Boating Forum members will work together to foster a culture of safety among recreational craft users and ultimately reduce instances of harm. Over the next two years, the strategy aims to influence significant year-on-year increases in recreational craft users using lifejackets, carrying two forms of waterproof communication, and checking the marine forecast.

The Safer Boating Forum is made up of regional and national bodies including Maritime New Zealand, Coastguard, New Zealand Sport Fishing Council, Surf Lifesaving, Water Safety, New Zealand Search and Rescue Council, and many others. OPERATIONS REPORT

HAKUMAU RESERVE

Work is now complete on the Hakumau Reserve fence modifications required for the lease, and we have signed the agreement for the use of this land.

There have been concerns expressed about the security of the facility in this new configuration. As a result of this the OBC has now become a two-tiered security zone. The first: entranceway, clubrooms and eastern launching ramps, are now less secure than once they were. However, it is important to remember that the boundaries are secured by fencing, we now have additional cameras and lighting, the barrier arms remain, and we still have 24-hour security in this area. We are looking at further measures, including



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having tow ball-type locking devices being made available at the office for members, if it is felt that it is warranted. We will continue to monitor the situation as time goes on. Please let us in the office know of any issues you are having, as this will help us tailor our response.

Once the work has been completed in the area adjacent to the tractor sheds a new swipe card security gate will be installed where the current yellow judder bar is located. This will provide the same level of security for the area east of this, as we had prior to having to carry out the work on our fencing. In the meantime, we have increased security patrols at night at the site until this work is completed.

WORK DUE TO BEGIN ON STAGES ONE AND TWO

Work is about to start on stages one and two to satisfy the terms of our new resource consent. The agreement has been signed and it is hoped that work will begin in late November or early December subject to us receiving our building consent from the Council. We have required the contractor to always maintain easy access to the site and, most of the time, they will endeavor to keep two lanes of the roadway open. But please be patient if, for any reason, this is temporarily not possible. Although it would seem counter intuitive to carry out this work at this time of year, the Club is usually quite quiet in the weeks prior to Christmas and the month of January, as people go away for their Christmas holidays. Also at this time of year the weather is drier, enabling the

works to be interrupted less by rain, and the risk of sediment escaping into the sea is reduced.

MARINA

This year's parcel of work on the Marina is now complete with Piers G and B having had the corner brackets replaced. In addition to this, all pile guides that were causing problems with the plastic sleeves have been replaced. This means that there are no longer shards of plastic ending up in the sea.

All the old, galvanized pile guides have been replaced with stainless steel and we will continue to monitor the few remaining existing old stainless steel pile guides to ensure they are still performing as they should. In addition to this, we have carried out a thorough inspection of the electricity supply to G and B and refurbished any power suppliers that were substandard.

FISHING REPORT

FISHING in the SEWER

As I was listening to the news on the morning I wrote this, I heard the good news that the rāhui on fishing and swimming in the Waitemata Harbour had been lifted. Equally interesting was a scientist interviewed, who said that testing after the recent break in a raw sewage pipe and the resulting effluent release showed that the harbour water was now at safe levels. However, they were still monitoring shellfish closely and results on the toxicity levels will be published soon. While it's devastating to hear

about any pollution in our marine environment it is timely to mention the inshore fishing that kicks off about this time. Usually around early December snapper and kingfish move inshore as the water warms up and can be found in very shallow water and estuarine areas, as well as right in the middle of the Waitemata Harbour and in areas past the Auckland Harbour Bridge.

With these transitory fish there comes a great opportunity to fit quick, fuel-efficient fishing trips into a couple of hours before or





after work. The fish you are likely to encounter are snapper in the 1-4kg range, that can provide excellent sport on light tackle. Unfortunately, many of the kingfish that take up residence in the harbour would not make the legal 75cm limit, but there are a few better fish around if you are prepared to work for them while practicing catch and release on any smaller specimens.

To chase the snapper there are two main techniques that will work really well when matched with the right conditions. Bait and burley fish on lightly weighted rigs fished in shallow channels and holes when the tide is rising, especially at the change of light, can provide incredible action. Fish areas like Meola Reef or the entrance to the Greenhithe Channel. Stealth and a delicate approach are the keys to success. The other great snapper technique is soft baiting in the main part of the Waitemata Harbour from North Head down to the Harbour Bridge. The key tips are to drag 4-inch curly tail soft baits using a loz jig head. Once you hit the bottom let out a bit of line to create slack every 30 seconds and let the drift tighten up your line. You want to feel your soft bait bouncing on the bottom. A small sea anchor can be very helpful if there is any wind, and the best conditions are when the wind is in the same direction as the tide. To chase the kingfish, small surface lures and saltwater flies will get a lot of attention from the smaller kingies especially around any structure like channel markers or jetties. To tempt the larger kingies, live baiting with piper is the technique to use. If you are fishing on the anchor drift the piper back using a small strong live bait hook through the bill of the piper. If the current is really strong use a very small sinker on the rig. This will also attract bigger snapper. Slow trolling piper rigged the same way past the same structure where the smaller

kingfish hang out will also tempt the bigger fish.

I would consider it more than safe to eat any snapper or kingfish that you catch under the current water quality information. I would not be collecting any shellfish close to town. The chances of getting sick from seafood are probably less than you would expect from a bit of poor food hygiene at a summer barbeque.

THE LANDING HAUL OUT AREA, OKAHU BAY

After a further round of submissions. the Orākei Local Board is now reconsidering its plan for this area. It is considering retaining 50 percent of the previous hardstand area for a short term haul out and wash down operation. The board has also decided, if feasible, to keep the existing filtration infrastructure and washdown pad to allow for a cost-recovery wash-down facility for small recreational boat users as they exit the sea-access ramp areas. The next step is for an expression of interest process to hear from parties interested in establishing and running a commercial short-stay haul-out facility.
