FEMALES TO THE FORE

I am fortunate to be writing this sitting in the saloon of Corniche anchored in the Okahu Channel, Bay of Islands, looking out at blue skies, clear blue water and a stunning beach. We have just spent the day on the beach with the grandkids digging sand-castles, snorkelling and diving off the paddle board and complaining how hot the sun is. We are incredibly blessed.

You will have noticed, I'm sure, a promotion in the Club's weekly email newsletter and an advertisement in this Outboarder for a seminar titled 'Boating Basics for Women'.

If you will indulge me momentarily, and many of you will have heard me comment passionately on this subject: A major disappointment to me at the OBC is the perceived lack of involvement of our female members, both in Club administration and on the water. We have in Karen Foley, our Vice Commodore, an extremely capable woman both at the Executive Committee and on the water.

I find it disheartening to watch at the Club ramps and see women predominantly take such a passive role in boating. This is not confined to trailer boats – the same is true on launches on the Marina.

I said in my opening I was fortunate to be spending my summer break at the Bay of Islands. I seldom see a woman at the helm.

I commend to you again, the Boating Basics for

Women seminar. I would also encourage those that are competent in boat management to join in at the event to support other less experienced women. From this event we can then gauge how further we can support our female Club members in their boating endeavours.

We are also keen to see more involvement at Club administration level.

We have a busy year ahead. The reconstruction of the washdown area will be underway by the time you receive this publication, we will be having serious discussions regarding the clubhouse, the Club's constitution will be updated and, meanwhile, several Club activities will be held for your pleasure.

SITE REDEVELOPMENT

Work is now underway on the first, second and third stages of the site redevelopment. As most will be aware, the first stage is the creation of a sea wall and back filling of the area adjacent to the tractor shed, along with the installation of an automatic trailer and boat washdown facility. This will mean that the previously sunken washdown site is temporarily out of use while the work is carried out.

The focus will be on the stage one work initially but as the project moves forward, the six new water filtration systems that are being installed along the northern sea wall will be started.

The Club will be working with the contractor to ensure that little disruption to parking in this area is caused to members and, where possible, alternate areas will be set aside. During this time the groundwork for stage three will be started, which will see a single toilet block being installed near the eastern end of the car park.

ENTRANCE AND EXIT

Works should be coming to an end soon on the Ngapipi Road bridge, but the extra footpath traffic generated by people not bothering to cross at the temporary traffic lights to reach the

new multi-million-dollar cycle and walkway is still present. Please be alert and careful when entering and exiting the Club, and check for runners, cyclists, and scooters. The Club has been in discussions with AT and has put forward a proposal that would see a set of offset barriers installed on either side of the entrance to slow footpath traffic and make the crossing safer for everyone but, so far, no update has been received.

NEW BUOY

The new replacement fairway buoy has been recently installed and seems to have met with the approval of most, even those that weren't keen on seeing it return. Entering and exiting the Club under the Ngapipi Road bridge on a busy day does require a level of attention and boat handling, and the fairway buoy and new reef marker poles are there to assist you to do that safely.

The fairway buoy creates a space between the incoming and outgoing traffic to avoid the chance of boats being on a collision course, and the reef markers mark the edge of the channel and a shallow reef that extends back towards the boat sheds.

This topic is covered at the new members evening but if anyone is unsure of how to approach this area, please call or come into the office and we can discuss it with you.

NEW RESTRICTIONS FIGHT EXOTIC CAULERPA

If you plan to visit Aotea Great Barrier Island, Ahuahu Great Mercury Island, Te Rāwhiti Inlet in the Bay of Islands, Kawau Island or Waiheke Island in your boat, you need to be aware of new fishing and anchoring restrictions in place to help stop the spread of the invasive seaweed exotic caulerpa.

Please:

- If you need to anchor on the western side of Aotea, use the anchoring zone, which is the yellow-marked area of Port Fitzroy on the accompanying map. This is a permit-free anchoring area.
- Before moving on, check your anchor, anchor chain and other equipment for any attached seaweed.
- If you find seaweed on your gear, remove it and bag or contain it securely. Dispose of it ashore – in household rubbish or compost, or in rubbish bins away from the sea.
- Report any sightings of suspected

exotic caulerpa from areas outside of the Aotea and Ahuahu Controlled Areas.

But remember:

- Don't anchor in Controlled Area Notice (CAN) zones where it is prohibited.
- Avoid fishing using any method that disturbs the seafloor, eg: flounder netting, dredging, trawling, in any CAN zones.
- In all places, it is illegal to move exotic caulerpa, even if you don't know it's there. Check carefully before you move from place to place.
- There is also a rāhui in place at Waiheke Island. Please avoid this area.

Don't fall foul of the rules. Make sure you are well-informed before you go and check for updates regularly at www.biosecurity.govt.nz/caulerpa

Just Wear It
TO SAVE LIVES ON THE WATER THIS SUMMER

In response to an increasing number of preventable drownings on watercraft in New Zealand, Coastguard and Water Safety New Zealand are pleading with kiwis to wear lifejackets while on the water this summer.

Drowning is the leading cause of recreational death in Aotearoa and according to recent data from Water Safety New Zealand, craft-related incidents account for 31 percent of those deaths. In 2022, there were 29 drowning fatalities from watercraft – 66 percent higher when compared to the 10-year average, and 21 of the people

who died weren't wearing a lifejacket. Coastguard NZ CEO Callum Gillespie says too many lives are being lost unnecessarily because people aren't wearing lifejackets. "A lifejacket has never ruined a day on the water, but not wearing one has destroyed many lives. Drownings are a devastating event for whānau, family and friends and for our incredible

volunteers who are on the frontline. These tragic deaths leave a long-lasting impact on our communities.

"We have a simple message for all watercraft users, whether you're on a boat, yacht, kayak, jet ski, SUP - whatever your waka - 'Just Wear It'. It's called a lifejacket for a reason."

Despite the sobering statistics, research shows more than a quarter of boaties surveyed aren't ensuring everyone on board has a lifejacket that fits them. While 86 percent of children are wearing a correctly fitting lifejacket, a third of adults are not wearing them the entire time they're on the water.

When it comes to why boaties aren't wearing lifejackets, 41 percent say they're not concerned with the potential for drownings, 46 percent say their boat/vessel can handle rough conditions okay, and 33 percent say that wearing lifejackets is inconvenient and uncomfortable. A further third say they simply did not want to, and a quarter say it's too expensive to buy more lifejackets.

According to Coastguard, in the event of unexpectedly entering the water people may have to tread water for at least 40 minutes, or hours in more remote locations, before help arrives. Without a lifejacket, this is incredibly difficult and drastically reduces your chance of survival.

Water Safety data suggests well over 90 percent of boaters and jet skiers agree that wearing a lifejacket should be mandatory everywhere in New Zealand. However at present, lifejacket bylaws vary from region to region. Coastguard and Water Safety NZ believe it should be mandatory for everyone to wear a lifejacket on vessels 6m and under while underway and are advocating the Government to act.

Water Safety New Zealand CEO Daniel Gerrard says: "Wearing a lifejacket isn't just a good practice, it's a vital step in

protecting lives. Every lifejacket worn is a potential tragedy averted, and we hope to see a day when not wearing one is as unthinkable as not wearing a seatbelt in a car. This summer, let's make 'Just Wear It' not just a slogan, but a universal practice on our waters."

Gillespie adds: "No one heads out expecting to get into trouble, but the fact we responded to 2596 incidents last year shows the unexpected happens all too often.

"We have a warm, dry and windy summer ahead, so we're expecting it to be busy out there. We really urge all kiwis to 'Just Wear It' and take better care on the water, and always wear a lifejacket."

If you need a new lifejacket or it's time to upgrade your old one, Coastguard's hitting the road across Aotearoa through to February with Old4New. Find out when the Old4New van will be in your town at old4new.coastguard.nz


PREVENTING COLLISIONS *is your responsibility*

From Maritime NZ

Recreational skippers have found themselves at the wrong end of maritime law recently, with one being charged over a collision between their power boat and a ferry, another sentenced over a causing a collision with a kayak and serious injuries to the paddler.

It's a reminder of the responsibilities recreational skippers hold in preventing collisions and keeping others safe.

All recreational skippers must understand the Maritime Rules; they include keeping a proper look out at all times, travelling at safe speed, using all available means to



determine if there is a risk of collision, and powered vessels keeping out of the way of vessels under oars or sail.

This means taking account of the harbour conditions, adjusting your speed and ensuring you can see adequately in front of you, particularly when you know there are a high number of recreational water users in the area.

Before you head out on the water:

Undertake a Coastguard Day Skipper course - www.boatingeducation.org.nz/courses/1/day-skipper This is an introductory course for recreational craft users or crew, including those new to boating.

Maritime Rules, including those on navigation and collision prevention can be found on the Maritime NZ website - www.maritimenz.govt.nz/recreational/rules-on-the-water Local bylaws are published by the local regional authority.

This by-product would be sold to candle makers back on shore, and the money raised – or the 'slush fund' – was often used to buy non-essential items for the crew, such as musical instruments or books.

COOK THE CATCH

Lobster OMELETTE

INGREDIENTS

SEAWEED BUTTER:

- 1/2 cup (115g) unsalted butter, room temp
 - 2 tbs edible seaweed, rehydrated and chopped
 - 2 tbs tarragon leaves, finely chopped
 - zest of 1 lemon
 - 1 tsp minced garlic
 - 1 tsp smoked paprika
 - 1/4 tsp salt
- Combine all ingredients and set aside

OMELETTE:

- 1 red onion, diced
- 1 Fresno chilli, finely diced
- 2 cloves garlic, thinly sliced
- Seaweed butter
- 1-1/2 cups lobster meat, cut into large chunks
- 5 heirloom cherry tomatoes, sliced in half
- Small handful of chives, thinly sliced
- 5 eggs
- 2 tbs mascarpone cheese
- 1 lemon

METHOD

1. Set a large nonstick skillet over med/ high heat and add two tsp olive oil. Add approx 3 tbs of seaweed butter and let foam briefly. Add onion, chilli and garlic and toss to combine. Lower the heat, add lobster meat and cook gently for a moment.
2. Add the tomatoes and toss. Taste for seasoning then transfer mixture to a bowl. Add chives and mix.
3. Crack eggs into another bowl, lightly whisk. Add a tbs or so of the seaweed



butter, then pour into the skillet over med heat. Stir vigorously with a spatula.

4. Once the eggs start to cook through, remove from heat. Flatten with the spatula and spoon lobster mixture down the centre of the eggs. Dollop mascarpone on top, then zest the lemon directly over the mix.

To serve, tilt the pan up and fold the sides of the eggs up and over the lobster mixture. Once folded, lift a plate up to the pan and let the omelette flip itself out onto the plate so that the mix is covered by the eggs. Serve immediately.

FISHING REPORT

From Adam Clancey

WANTED *Alive or Dead*

Without doubt one of the best ways to target predatory fish is with live bait. Most game fish, as well as species like snapper, John Dory and hapuku, respond very well to live baits. But there are often occasions where live bait is not freely available, and if you still want to target fish the only option is dead bait. While getting fish to respond to dead bait can be a little more challenging, there are a lot of tactics that you can use to make sure your bait is presented in the best possible way.

On many trips live baiting, if for whatever reason I have lost all my live bait fishing in an area where it is unlikely that I can catch

more, needs must that I use dead bait. The first thing to remember is to keep your dead baits in the best possible condition. Leaving them on the bait board to dry out and go crusty is not the best. Ideally, once a bait is dead it should be put onto ice or at minimum kept cool and moist. Try and keep the bait as straight as possible. Many times I have been on extended trips and kept a couple of dead baits for the start of the day, and they get taken as readily as fresh live baits. This is especially the case

with big kingfish.

The favoured baits to keep as dead baits are smaller kahawai, any type of mackerel and - the best in my mind - piper.

Rigging dead baits is different to live baits. I find the best way is to use a two-hook fixed rig with one hook through the centre of the jaw and the second mounted near the tail. Using straight hooks rather than offset is a good idea as it will prevent the baits from spinning and looking unnatural. When you start using a dead bait that has been chilled it pays to give it a bend to take out the rigour mortis. You can even carefully break the backbone to make it more supple. There are many ways that dead baits can be rigged to make them swim naturally and if you intend to troll them for a long time it would be worth investigating the techniques.

When I am fishing with fresh dead bait I use a few different techniques. As mentioned, at first light when fishing for kingfish I will simply let a dead bait out behind the boat, either free drifting or suspended under a float or balloon. Usually, I suspend these baits on a 3m leader and let the action of the boat work the bait. When prospecting in areas, casting dead baits into washes and around reefs will definitely entice action from big snapper, kingfish and John Dory. The best approach is to cast the dead bait into the desired area, let it sink slowly and then start retrieving it. If you see a fish, follow it, speed up the retrieve or twitch the rod tip to invoke a strike. When a fish grabs a dead bait using this technique you may need to put the reel in free spool or give the fish a little slack and allow it time to swallow the bait before you strike.

Trolling dead baits is a great way to catch surface feeding predators like kingfish and marlin but you will need to rig your baits to not spin. Most trolled dead baits work well at 2-5 knots. Fish with the drag set lightly so that the fish can pull line without over-running the reel when it bites.

My final and favourite way to fish a dead bait, especially for big snapper and kingfish,

is a flutter bait. I always fish this when anchored or drifting slowly. To rig this cut down the middle of the bait from top to bottom, from the point behind the gills to the tail. Then place a circle hook with the point facing the mouth of the fish and add a 2-4 oz ball sinker on top of the hook. Lower this bait to a metre or so from the bottom and set it in the rod holder with the drag on. The two flapping sides will attract fish with the motion of the boat giving the action.

I can't count the number of times a fresh, well looked after dead bait has saved my fishing day and some days dead bait can be the best way to catch fish. Don't think it's just limited to game fishing as any predator will take a well-presented dead bait.

2024 SEASON GOING OFF!



STABLE *cruiser*

BOAT REVIEW

Sasga Menorquín 42 HT



The Sasga Menorquín 42 HT represents a rare breed in New Zealand: a European take on a trawler style vessel capable of long-range cruising and handling rough conditions in comfort, with a light brush of retro charm.

Sasga Yachts NZ sees the target market as the mature boatie, possibly an ex-sailor, who appreciates open water sea handling and traditional nautical design. The boats are named for one of the Balearic Islands in Spain, where they are built.

Their hull shape reflects those of the traditional Balearic Islands fishing boats, with workboat charm in the straight stem, high gunwales and a fine, flared bow that carves through the sea with a spray-deflecting hard chine running all the way aft. The signature feature is the stem post on the bow profile, a hark back to yesteryear when similar boats were built in timber. The modern construction is resin-infused moulding technology.

The rounded stern hints at the boat's Mediterranean origins, although it's not a true canoe stern, as the hull finishes straight across, out of sight beneath the point where the transom meets the swimboard. This means the generous 4m beam extends all the way aft to provide maximum space in the engine room.

The Sasga 42 will appeal to those who appreciate lower fuel bills and a steady gait

through the waves.

The cockpit is sparsely furnished with just one permanent seat for two over a locker. It's a blank canvas, awaiting folding table and director's chairs which could be stowed in the vast engine room beneath the cockpit. There is a hot and cold shower in the transom for use on the swimboard. The clears, managed with substantial clips, are easily deployed to enclose the cockpit in all weathers, and take advantage of the saloon's air-conditioning and heating.

This is an indoor-outdoor flow kind of boat, with the bi-fold doors providing instant access to the mid-size galley to port. The galley makes diligent use of space thanks to dedicated compartments for cutlery, crockery, glassware and pans. It is well equipped with a fridge / freezer, twin electric ceramic hob with pan brackets, large sink and a countertop in Silestone marble, electric oven with microwave, and an extractor hood above.

For'ard, the galley meets a large, flat-topped cabinet. In the old days this would be handy for reading paper charts. The cabinet is home to a 28-inch TV which rises on command from a remote control.

The saloon dining table with upholstered, three-sided seating for six is to starboard opposite the galley, with a clear divide from the helm. The table seating converts to a double berth.

The helmseat, with room for two and a small fridge underneath, is the skipper's happy place. There's a full suite of Raymarine electronics including radar, plotter and depth sounder displayed on a 12-inch touch screen. These are complemented by controls for VHF radio with AIS trans/receive, auto anchor, searchlight, Zipwake, bow thruster and full Volvo controls and instrumentation.

To adjust the trim fore and aft, and laterally, the Sasga 42 has Zipwake interceptor blades that lift and lower to affect the boat's attitude in the water. As expected, the Sasga easily chomped through the waves. With twin Volvo D4-320hp engines supplying the power, the Sasga 42 has a top speed of 23 knots, with a cruising speed of 10-17 knots.

Accommodation below decks is accessed by five steps, offset to port in the for'ard saloon. There are three cabins - a master suite in the foc's'cle, a twin cabin to starboard and a double island berth to port under the saloon. There are two bathrooms opposite each other, one of which is an ensuite for the master cabin.

The Sasga 42 delivers simple boating. It is excellent for comfortable cruising, easy living, the enclosed cockpit for al fresco entertainment, and the huge swimboard is water fun city. It is built to the European Category A rating, the toughest standard for vessels of more than 40ft. This means it

is considered suitable for seas up to 3m and winds of 34-40 knots.

Sea Lice

Sea lice /
kutu moana are
isopods, a type of
invertebrate
(has no backbone) that
is part of the greater
crustacean group of
animals.

A brownish colour,
sea lice can be
hard to spot.
They grow up to
1cm in length.

They will also feed on anything dead and rotting, even baits and fish in traps and nets.



Sea lice do not generally feed on humans, although you might occasionally get a nip from a bigger one if you happen to be in their habitat at certain times/tides.

So, if they don't feed on us, what caused that itchy rash we blame on 'sea lice'?

It's more likely to be from the microscopic larvae of jellyfish or sea anemones. The larvae get trapped in your hair, or under your bathing suit, and when your suit rubs against

your skin, the larvae release toxins that cause the annoying, itchy rash.

If you get 'bitten', the best treatment is to take off your bathing suit and have a shower. Wash your suit in hot water to get rid of any larvae and dig out the good old calamine lotion to ease that itching!


